## INTRODUCTION TO PUBLIC SPEAKING COM K173- SPRING 2015

**Course Description:** Public Speaking introduces students to the principles and basic skills of effective communication. Students will research, compose and deliver speeches of increasing complexity and sophistication. The course familiarizes students with the strategies and techniques of successful informative and persuasive public speaking so students gain an understanding of how communication happens and how people participate in public discourse. The course also exposes students to the rhetorical dimensions of many types of public speech and teaches them to be more critical listeners who respond rhetorically to complex issues and ideas.

### **Course Outcomes and Guidelines:**

- 1. Demonstrate, describe, and apply an understanding of the relevant principles of speech communication, reasoning, and argumentation.
- 2. Critically evaluate examples of public discourse.
- 3. Demonstrate the acquisition of skills in public speaking and argumentation within several speech structures and contexts.
- 4. Demonstrate an ethical and effective use of academic research.
- 5. Demonstrate an appreciation of the relationship of speech communication to society.

### **Required Text:**

Zarefsky, David. Public Speaking: Strategies for Success. Pearson, 2014. (Seventh Edition)

**Procedures:** Lectures will be minimal---student involvement and participation will be maximal. Students will be responsible for the following:

1. (65% of the grade) Individual/ Group Presentations (8 per student):

Introductory Speech (1 minute)

Object Presentation (2 minutes)

Group Chapter Presentation (15-20 minutes)

Two Informative Speeches (4-7 minutes each)

Persuasive Speech (8-10 minutes)

Two Impromptu Speeches (1-2 minutes each) Informal In-Class Speaking Activities and Speaking-Related

Activities (various lengths)

- 2. (10% of the grade) Critique Activities (oral and written)
- 3. (20% of the grade) Tests (1 in-class quiz, 1 midterm, and 1 final exam)
- 4. (5% of the grade) Attendance/Being Ready on Assigned Dates/Related Written Work The above percentages are approximate.

**Grading Method:** In this course, you will have the opportunity to participate in activities designed to improve your communication skills. All the activities will have a point value. List of these activities and point values are attached. In order to participate in the activities, you must be present in class the day of the activity. Because communication involves your interaction with others, *no class activities can be made up outside of class*, and *no extra work is assigned as make-up work for any missed activities*.

# Written assignments handed in late receive no credit! NO EXCEPTIONS!

Anyone who does not come to class on their assigned speech/presentation day (without **first** having put a message on my email **prior to class**) or comes to class with an excuse for not presenting their talk that day (and does not let me know **prior to my entering the room**)...will automatically have 10% of the potential points deducted from their grade. **NO EXCEPTIONS**. Above referred to "**prior excuses**" are allowed only **once a semester!!** After that, the 10% penalty will apply even to "**prior excuses**."

All class days after your appointed day until you actually give your talk are considered days that your speech presentation is due, and an additional 10% of the original potential points will be deducted for each class (missed or attended) that student is unprepared until the speech/presentation is given.

**Possible:** 600 points. A 45-point cushion is built into the final grading system in case of a missed class, poor performance on a test or presentation, etc.

If a student violates this principle, (s)he will receive a penalty ranging in severity from an "F" on the assignment to an "F" in the course. Academic integrity is essential to a useful education. Failure to act with academic integrity severely limits a person's ability to succeed in the classroom and beyond. Furthermore, academic dishonesty erodes the legitimacy of every degree awarded by the College. In this class and in the courses of your academic career, present only your own best work; clearly document the sources of the material you use from others; and act at all times with honor.
