Course Description:

ESOL 061 prepares non-native English speakers for the demands of ESOL 063 and other college-level courses. This is an integrated writing, reading, speaking, and listening course which includes high-intermediate grammar work. Students will refine sentence level writing skills and expand on paragraph development and organization. Reading assignments stress comprehension and academic vocabulary building. Students will improve speaking and listening skills through group work, class discussions, and presentations. This course does not satisfy an English requirement or an elective in any degree program, nor do its credits count toward graduation.

Course Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

Writing

- Use writing strategies including cluster diagraming and editing.
- Draft unified and coherent paragraphs in various patterns of organization.
- Use clear examples and sufficient details to support the main idea.

Reading

- Use reading strategies such as making inferences and applying information.
- Increase reading comprehension and academic vocabulary using nonfiction work, selections from textbooks, and authentic articles.

Speaking and Listening

- Extract key details from authentic listening exercises.
- Demonstrate confidence in level-appropriate small group discussions and group presentations.

Grammar

• Demonstrate reasonable control of high-intermediate grammatical structures in practical and academic contexts.

College Withdrawal Policy:

A student who finds it necessary to discontinue a course once class has met must provide notice to the Registrar. Simply, fill out the withdrawal form and give it to the Registrar's office. Withdrawal forms are available at the Registrar's office and at the office at the sub-base. Non-punitive "W" grades are assigned to withdrawal requests. An Instructor's signature is required after the deadline has passed. No withdrawals are permitted after the last class preceding the final exam. Students who do not obtain an official withdrawal, but simply stop attending class receive an "F" grade for the course.

UF (unearned F) Grade:

This notation is awarded to students who were enrolled in a course, did not officially withdraw, but who failed to participate in course activities through the end of the term. It is used when, in the judgment of the instructor, completed assignments and/or course activities were insufficient to make normal evaluation of academic performance possible. Students who receive this notation will have reported on their behalf a "last date of participation" by the assigning faculty member. When saved on the grade roster, this notation will immediately convert to a regular grade of F on the student's transcript. It will be

punitive and count in the GPA. The UF notation is used for internal reporting and will not appear on the student's transcript.
