Course Description

The content of this course is designed to help you make a smooth and successful transition to college. Information on how to succeed in college in terms of studying, balancing family and job responsibilities with new college demands, planning for the future, and just knowing "the ropes" will be provided for you. You can expect regular reading and writing assignments along with classroom discussion as you investigate how to be successful in this new environment. It is an opportunity to take an introspective look at yourself and your personal growth as a student and individual.

College Withdrawal Policy

The deadline for students to withdraw is a week before classes end. Before withdrawing from any course, speak to the professor to discuss the positive and negative consequences of that action. Students must with draw from a class in writing at the Registrar's Office. (I encourage you to also speak with financial aid if you are using financial aid). Not attending class is not dropping or withdrawing from a class.

Attendance Policy

Class participation, in-class writing, speaking, and activities determine part of each student's grade; therefore, each student is expected to attend all classes and to participate in all class discussions. This may not be easy for you but I expect you to work toward this end. Attendance is taken at the beginning of each class. Late arrivals will be so noted as will students that leave before the end of the scheduled class time and may count as an absence for the class.

This is a three credit course that meets once a week, therefore more than one class absence may compromise your final grade. Be aware of your responsibility to attend class. After two absences your grade may be dropped for each absence taken. Three absences for any reason will require a one on one meeting between the professor and the student to determine if it is in the best interest of the student to continue in the course and your grade will be lowered due to absences. This meeting must be initiated by the student. Additional absences may result in failure for this class.

Choose a class buddy to pick up papers and handouts in the event you are absent, then you will have the information from the class. You should exchange contact information today. This is your responsibility, to the handouts and material from the class you miss.

Classroom Policy: BE POLITE!

It is my belief that if you follow this simple rule all things will fall into place. I do my best to adhere to this rule in my life and I encourage you to adopt this rule for yourself. It is necessary for this class as it requires two things from you: **Respect and Responsibility.** Being a mature college student entails both qualities. This means you are responsible for yourself, your education, your assignments, your behavior, your attitude, your timeliness, and your contributions; show respect for self and others and help to make our classroom atmosphere positive and conducive to learning. You can do this by being prompt to class, attentive while others are speaking, prepared to actively participate, supportive to others, and contribute to a positive classroom climate. Keep your cell phone out of sight and do not use it during class time.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Acceptance of late homework/assignments is done on a case-by-case basis. The penalty assessed is based upon several criteria including: informing me ahead of time, how late the assignment is, and the reason why the assignment is late. The best thing to do if you find yourself in this situation is to contact me directly. Assignments that are more than two weeks past due are not going to be accepted unless you have approval of the instructor.

Reminder: This class is scheduled from 2:00 PM – 4:45PM. You should try to arrive at least 10 minutes early to be prepared for the start of the class and you can expect that class may run over by 10 minutes on very rare occasions. There will be a break midway through class, leaving the class during lecture or activities is not advised. Of course if you have a medical issue, please advise me.

GRADING CRITERIA

This course requires active involvement in learning experiences accompanied by reading, writing, and speaking activities that capture those experiences. The nature of the course content requires critical thinking skills to be learned, developed and applied. If for any reason you're absent from class on the day of a test or assignment that is due, please contact me <u>in advance (before noon)</u> to reschedule. The following criteria will be used in evaluating your grade:

Participation and Homework: (250 points): Students are expected to come to class prepared each week and actively participate in discussions. You can earn 5 points weekly for attendance and participation. A rubric will be distributed that outlines how participation will be graded. An introductory meeting with the Professor is part of the participation grade. Homework, as well as an organized comprehensive notebook (3-ring-binder) that includes the handouts, assignments, and your research, is important to maintain and bring to class each week. Your notebook is subject to review at any time during the semester. Quizzes, discussion questions, journal/discussion postings and additional assignments will be part of the participation grade. Each student will be responsible to outline a chapter from the book and make a 20 minutes presentation with a handout of important information from the chapter.

In-Class Reflection Papers: (50 points) At the end of some classes you will spend some time reflecting on what was covered in and outside of class. The paper will be done in class and will be based on guided questions. While grammar and punctuation will be checked, the paper will be graded based upon content and treated as a rough draft. Complete sentences and legible handwriting is a expected. You will NOT be able to make up reflections if you are absent as they will relate to the topics covered in the class/readings/guest speakers.

TRCC Event: (50 points) Each student must attend a **TRCC** event before April 17th. Notify the professor beforehand of the event you will attend.

You will write a 2 page essay about the event you attended, introducing it and commenting on it. You should include information that describes the event, identifies the sponsor, time of the event, where the event was held, a critical analysis of the event, and why you chose it as well as provide examples, additional facts, etc. A copy of this essay must be uploaded to your * learning portfolio*. A 2-3 minute overview will be given in class. MORE INFORMATION TO FOLLOW!

*Coping with College: (100 points) Write a 3 page reflective paper that addresses issues about you: Why is going to or returning to college important for you? What is going to be your greatest challenge? How will you overcome it? How do you think college will change your roles, routines, and relationships? What and who are some of your supports and what are obstacles you think you will face? How will you work around obstacles that might prevent your success? What are some things you will do this semester to ensure your own success? What will be easy and what will challenge you? What are two things you must do as you build your plan for success? Why is a plan for success important? What help will you be seeking from me as your FYE instructor?

*All students are required to maintain an online learning portfolio using a TRCC designed template. Through this electronic tool, students can see their own growth in college-wide learning. The student can keep and continue to use the Digication account after graduation. A Three Rivers General Education Assessment Team will select random works to improve the college experience for all. No names will be attached to the assessment work; it will remain private and anonymous for college improvement purposes. In class outlines, students will find recommended assignments which support various college-wide learning abilities. The student will have a tool which can integrate their learning from the classroom, school, and life and allow for another opportunity of learning at TRCC! Students will be able to make multiple portfolios.

Group Project: (100 points) Student Presentations: In a group of 2 - 4 students, each team will make a video (not a PowerPoint) giving advice to next year's entering students. The video must be at least 10 minutes long. Be creative. Further details of this assignment will be discussed in class.

Syllabus Test (50 points) - The syllabus test will be composed of the following: multiple choice, true-false, short answer, matching, and essay questions. This is given on the second week of class. If for any reason your absent from class on the day of the test, please contact me in advance to take the test in the TESTING CENTER prior to the next class.

Mid Term Exam and Final Exam: (100 points each) The mid-term and final exam will be an opportunity for students to review what they have read and learned through class participation, readings, and guest speakers. If for any reason your absent from class on the day of a test, please contact me <u>in advance</u> to reschedule. Testing will be made up in the TESTING CENTER. It is your responsibility to complete it within the school week prior to the next class, except for extenuating circumstances discussed and approved by the instructor.

*Educational Plan and Career Exploration Portfolio: (200 points) This four part assignment will help you map your coursework (requires you to meet your advisor and obtain a signed plan of study), provide an oral report of information reviewed, design a realistic plan for accomplishing your coursework, and learn to work with your advisor to accomplish your goals. This will serve as a foundation for your Career Exploration Portfolio Assignment that will include research on a career topic that aligns with your Educational Plan. *Additional information will be given out during a future class..

Final Exam: If you have an A average and have not missed more than one class during the semester, you may earn the right to be exempt from the final exam. This will be determined at the discretion of the instructor.
