COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course will explore all sides of the various issues that are currently being discussed by politicians and the electorate in America. These issues may include immigration policies, anti-poverty programs, gay and lesbian rights, legalization of marijuana, campaign finance reform, America's health care system, the USA Patriot Act, stem cell research, global warming, US military intervention abroad, abortion, gun control, crime. Since this is a seminar class, students will be expected to prepare multimedia presentations and participate in political debates to encourage independent thinking, critical analysis, and scholarly discussions.

REQUIRED TEXTS: Two textbooks that I have custom published, both entitled "Issues in Contemporary American Politics." I AM NOT EARNING A DIME OFF THESE BOOKS! Total cost: \$120.

Grade: 20% **BOOK REVIEW**, 15% class participation which includes attendance, 25% research project, 20% midterm, and 20% final.

Grammar will be 25% of the grade on all written assignments. Properly Citing your sources will be 15% of the grade, and 10 points will be deducted per day for all assignments handed in late.

RESEARCH PROJECT: DUE MONDAY, March 4 - DO NOT EMAIL ME THE PAPER! (You may email me homework and the take-home final) Grammar is 25% of the grade. Please see the staff of the Writing Center for assistance – they are wonderful and nice and will help you with the paper. You can even email them a paper, and they will reply back with comments.

I want to select a political issue that interests you and write a 8 to 10 page report on the issue. Begin by describing the issue in detail using relevant statistics (what is the

problem, what caused the problem, who does it affect, why should we be concerned), then present both sides of the issue. The library has an extensive collection of magazines that will help you, including but not limited to Newsweek, Time, U.S. News, and the Economist. It also has Nexus-Lexus, a computerized database of thousands of Newspapers across the country. The paper must cite at least 10 sources (at least 3 of which must be books) so that students are exposed to a variety of perspectives on their issue. **Grammar is 25% of the grade.**

All facts and quotes must be properly cited. All works must be properly cited.

Book review: Read a book on a political issue and critique it. State what you liked about the book, disliked, was the book biased or objective. Please make sure I approve your book before you critique it. 4-5 pages, doublespaced

DIGICATION: As a student, you are required to maintain an online learning portfolio using a college-designed template in Digication. Through this electronic tool you will have the opportunity to monitor your own growth in college-wide learning. It may even help you determine a major that is best suited to you. You will be able to keep and maintain your learning portfolio after graduation. A Three Rivers General Education Assessment Team will select and review random works to improve the college experience for all. If your work is selected and reviewed for assessment purposes, it will remain anonymous and private. Digication provides a “place” where you will connect your learning from the classroom, college, and life in general. Sometimes when you review all of the work you have done and think about it, you end up learning something different and perhaps unexpected. Please review your course outlines to determine what assignments to upload into the TRCC Digication template and please post your own choices, as well. Have fun in learning!

College Withdrawal Policy: A student who finds it necessary to discontinue a course **MUST** complete a withdrawal form obtained from the Registrar’s Office.
