Course Description:

Using our main textbook as a guide, and the internet as a growing source of knowledge and information, we will explore--through readings, videos, lectures, projects and discussions--how sociology might help us to understand our own society, in a dramatically changing world.

Course Objectives:

A main objective of this course is to help participants learn key terms, questions and perspectives in sociology.

In the process we will encourage each other to find ways to "do sociology"--to develop a "sociological imagination"--as a means of understanding (if not doing something about) the society and world in which we live.

Projects and assignment requirements:

Article write-ups (4): 50 points each

You are required to complete 4 current event article write-ups. Each article should be a current event that relates in some way to Sociology. Each paper should be a minimum of 2 pages (typed, double-spaced, Times New Roman) and should contain a summary of the article, a paragraph on how it relates to Sociology, and a personal response to the article (agree or disagree? What are your opinions on the topic?).

Quizzes (4): 50 points each

Quizzes are based on readings from the book and will be assigned in advance. Check online for study guides.

“Crash” Paper: 100 points

“Outliers” book analysis: 100 points
