

INTERMEDIATE ACCOUNTING I

Fall 2015 (ACCT 271, 3 credits)
Monday 6:30 – 9:15 E 221
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Prerequisite:

Successful completion of ACC 112 with a "C" grade or better

Course Description:

This course is an intensive study of financial accounting theory focusing on revenue and expense recognition and the valuation and disclosure of financial statement elements, as well as preparing, understanding and analyzing financial statements.

Instructional Methodology:

The primary method of instruction will be classroom lectures and group problem solving.

Required Materials:

Required text: Intermediate Accounting, 15th edition, Kieso, Weygandt & Warfield,

Wiley & Sons.

Supplements: Study Guide (Optional)

Calculator (No cell phones and no texting during class)

Educational Objectives and Learning Outcomes:

- Understanding of conceptual framework and fundamental concepts
- Working knowledge of accounting cycle
- Working knowledge of GAAP
- Ability to calculate accrual to cash conversions
- Prepare trial balance and extract data to prepare financial statements
- Working knowledge of the International "IFRS" Financial Reporting Standards
- Ability to analyze financial statements

Grading and Classroom Policies and Overall Evaluation:

The grading policy will be the same as stated in the manual of Policy and Procedures on Grades and Quality Points. Four tests will be given that will count towards 80% of your final grade. A writing assignment will be worth 8 exam grade points. Failure to complete the writing assignment will have a negative 20 point impact on grade. There will be 2 accounting projects which will be worth 20% of the final grade. You will not pass the class if you do not complete all projects and assignments. Also, an accreditation exam will be given. More details to follow.

If a test is missed, a makeup will not be allowed. A cumulative exam will be offered to those students who have missed a test or are unhappy about a test grade. The exam will count as the missed test or replace your lowest test grade.

Writing Assignment:

Each student is required to write a 2-3 page paper on "IFRS" International Financial Reporting Standards. Further guidance in class will be provided.

Project #1:

Each student is required to prepare a 2-year final adjusted trial balance. From that information, financial statements will be prepared. The trial balance should contain approximately 25 accounts. Remember, these accounts will be needed to prepare an Income Statement, Balance Sheet, Statement of Stockholders Equity, and Statement of Cash Flows. And of course, pursuant to GAAP, the trial balance will be prepared on the accrual basis method of accounting. **No assistance from templates or accounting software is allowed.**

Project #2:

Group Project – Each Group will be responsible for analyzing the financial statements of a publicly traded company, and present the findings to the class. Be creative, and integrate as many accounting concepts as possible during your presentation. Each group will be graded on accounting knowledge and their ability to present and explain the various accounting concepts/issues.
