This is a basic course in environmental studies that introduces ecological principles and a global perspective on environmental problems such as deforestation, global climate change, droughts, floods, soil erosion, loss of biodiversity, and pollutants. It describes, in detail, the study of the biological and physical aspects of the environment and related issues, highlighting sound science, sustainability, and stewardship. Additionally, this course emphasizes a global and cross-cultural perspective on issues pertaining to environmental science, including discussions on human population expansion, environmental racism, socioeconomic stratification, global stewardship, social modernization, and establishing a framework for a sustainable future.
