# Co-requisite: ENG\*K101 and CJS\*K101 or SOC\*K101 recommended

This course will investigate the relationship between crime and contemporary society. Emphasis will be placed on sociological, psychological and physiological and biosocial explanations for criminal behavior. The course will review and apply social science research methods, examine the historical development of the science of criminology and analyses both the formal and informal means of social control.

## Course Competencies:

Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of history, philosophy and scientific method on the area of criminology

Recognize, understand, evaluate and articulate integrated theories of deviance. Discuss the relationship between theoretical perspectives and public policy.

Appreciate the impact of economics, social class, race, gender and each of the social institutions on defining crime and the mechanisms for social control.

Understand and articulate the issues of crime victims and the science of victimology.

If there is no work cited and/or internal citations the paper will not be corrected or graded. Should you need clarification on topic or are having difficulty identifying an area of interest, please feel free to discuss that with the instructor.

Mini research papers are due by midnight on the due date. No papers will be accepted after the deadline unless there are verifiable appropriate reasons for a late submission.
