Course Description:

In this intensive course, students will work extensively on the sentence level and paragraph skills of high beginner grammatical structures through speaking, listening, reading and writing exercises. They will also generate personal writing through narration, description, and opinion. Students will be introduced to the writing process and reading strategies. This is an interactive, participatory class.

Course Objectives:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Construct simple and compound sentences utilizing the present, past, progressive, and future tenses.
2. Write paragraphs about classmates, family, and friends.
3. Write paragraphs of giving instructions, description, and expressing an opinion.
4. Answer reading comprehension questions in complete sentences both orally and in writing.
5. Identify and utilize the basic grammatical structures and vocabulary of reading texts.
6. Participate in level-appropriate conversation.

Attendance:

- Students are expected to attend all classes. If a student misses classes it will reflect in a lower participation grade, regardless of the reason(s) for which they occur.
- Class begins promptly; please avoid being late or leaving early.
- It is the students' responsibility to find out what they missed.
- Late homework will not be accepted.
- Final Exams cannot be made up after the last day of classes.

College Withdrawal Policy:

A student who finds it necessary to discontinue a course once class has met must provide notice to the Registrar. Simply, fill out the withdrawal form and give it to the Registrar's office. Withdrawal forms are available at the Registrar's office and at the office at the sub-base. Non-punitive "W" grades are assigned to withdrawal requests. An Instructor's signature is required after the deadline has passed. No withdrawals are permitted after the last class preceding the final exam. Students who do not obtain an official withdrawal, but simply stop attending class receive an "F" grade for the course.

UF (unearned F) Grade:

This notation is awarded to students who were enrolled in a course, did not officially withdraw, but who failed to participate in course activities through the end of the term. It is used when, in the judgment of the instructor, completed assignments and/or course activities were insufficient to make normal evaluation of academic performance possible. Students who receive this notation will have reported on their behalf a “last date of participation” by the assigning faculty member. When saved on the grade roster, this notation will immediately convert to a regular grade of F on the student’s transcript. It will be punitive and count in the GPA. The UF notation is used for internal reporting and will not appear on the student’s transcript.

All students are required to maintain a learning portfolio in Digication that uses the (Three Rivers) College Template.

Plagiarism:

Plagiarism is the unacknowledged use of another person’s words or ideas in your writing. If you use any ideas, thoughts, writing, quotes, or even paraphrase some other writer’s thinking, you must acknowledge that person. Whether conscious or unconscious, plagiarism is a serious academic offence. Consequences for plagiarism can range from failing the assignment to failing the course.
