Art K112: Drawing II

Course Description

In this class, students will get the opportunity to expand upon what they have learned in Drawing I. Both representation and abstraction will be explored. The use of color in the form of pastels will be introduced. As a visual language, drawing becomes the means in which the student can truly begin to explore their own objectives for personal expression. The goal of this course is to help you further your drawing skills for the purpose of developing a more personal body of work. In class, there will be due dates and students must complete drawings for each of these. Five drawings will have parameters designated by the instructor. A minimum of two additional drawings will be required, the subject of which will be open- the instructor and the student will individually agree on the specifics of these assignments.

Learning Outcomes

Both representation and abstraction will be explored to create dynamic compositions. Students will begin to set their own goals for their drawings and to continue to develop their own style. Assignments will be worked on both inside and outside of class. Individual critiques will be held at most class meetings. You should plan to spend a minimum of two hours in preparation for each class hour (12 hours per week) outside of class on your drawings. Those that put forth effort in this class will inevitably show improvement in their work as the class progresses. *You get out of it what you put into it.* Also, students should begin to develop and utilize an informed visual vocabulary through the group critiques and discussions that are held together with the Drawing III class.

Reading and Writing Assignments

There will be one 2-3 page writing assignment for this course which will be a reaction paper based on an article chosen from the current issue of one of the two contemporary art magazines located at the Library: Art In America and Art News. A group discussion will be held on this due date. Students have the option of sitting in on the Drawing III students' biweekly discussions of their writing assignments. After the initial 5 art assignments are completed and we move onto the open assignments, students will be required to put into writing their personal goals and expectations for their subsequent drawings.

Evaluation Procedures

All materials involved such as written goals and the end product for each project will be collected on assignment due dates. On their due date, assignments should be complete at the beginning of class. Assignments will be graded primarily on the amount of time and effort that is put into them. Those that put forth effort in this class will inevitably show improvement in their work as the class progresses.

Class Discussion

You are expected to be in class with a positive attitude. A positive and amicable environment is a good learning environment. Participating with energy and enthusiasm in class exercises and critiques is to everyone's benefit. Everyone should contribute frequently in each critique. Those who participate more will receive a higher grade in this area.

Course Requirements

Attendance- Please plan to attend all classes and to miss class only for extenuating circumstances. Attendance on critique dates is mandatory. An absence on a critique date will be recorded as two absences (unless a legitimate written excuse is provided.)

Tardiness/Leaving Early- Most class announcements are made either at the beginning or end of class. Students who arrive late to class or leave class early will not only miss hearing important information, but also are disruptive to the rest of the class, as the instructor may have to repeat information. Every two times a student leaves early or arrives late equals one absence. Deadlines- Assignments not completed on time will be lowered one letter grade for each class they are late (an A becomes a B.)

Completion of all assignments and attendance at final critique- No student may receive a passing grade for this class without completing the minimum amount of art assignments and must be present at the final critique to pass the course (unless a legitimate written excuse is provided.)

Explanation of Criteria for Evaluation/Grade Weights

Projects- The average of all project grades and papers comprises 55% of the final grade. Class Participation/Attendance- This comprises 30% of the final grade. Effort/Improvement- This comprises 15% of the final grade.

On the last class meeting, students will resubmit all artwork from the semester. This comprises the final portfolio. A pick-up date for students to get their portfolios back will be scheduled within two weeks following the last day of classes. The professor will inform students of this date once it has been scheduled. There is a college-wide Student Art Show at the end of every academic year in May. All students who take an art class are invited to submit one piece done in each class to this show. Students should notify the professor when submitting their final portfolios and she will hold their work and submit it to the show if requested. Several cash prizes are awarded to students whose work is displayed in the Student Art Show by an outside juror.

Assignment 1 Basic Form Review

We will have discussed in class, basic geometric forms such as spheres, cylinders, cones, and cubes. These exercises have served as a review, and also as a beginning for exploration of the pastel medium. For homework, *create a shadow box (see handout)* then choose at least five objects with different geometric shapes as a still life. Light your objects with a clip light and a 60 to 100 watt bulb. Fill the whole page with your drawing and blow up the objects on your paper so that you are touching the edges and/or breaking outside of the picture plane in order to create visual shapes with your negative space.

Use pastels on 18" x 24" charcoal paper. Cut the perforated edge off your paper **before** the due date.

Assignment 2

Still Life Using Color

You will be working from a still life that you can transport between home and the classroom by choosing objects that can fit and be hot-glued or taped into a cardboard box. Put down colored paper or fabric into the box as a backdrop. Use at least five objects with different shapes, colors and textures. Light your objects with a 60-100 watt bulb. Fill the whole page with your drawing and blow up your objects on your paper so that the cardboard box is omitted, or mostly omitted. Use pastels on 18" x 24" charcoal paper. Cut the perforated edge off your paper **before** the due date.

Assignment 3

Abstracted Still Life

You will have a choice of working from the still life you used for the first assignment, or a new still life. Regardless, this will be a still life that you can transport from home and the classroom. Use at least five objects. Abstract your still life. This can be done in a variety of ways:

- Through simplification/reduction
- Repetition of elements
- A cubist approach
- Distortion of shapes (geometricizing)
- · Highly expressive approach/emphasis on mark-making
- Exaggerating depth or form

You must choose a focus for your piece – one of the elements of art: line, shape, color, texture, or value. You may work in either color or black and white. If you use color, you may use the full range of colors or you may limit your palette. You may choose to light your objects with a single bulb if your focus warrants this.

Use either pastels or charcoal on two pieces of 18" x 24" charcoal paper taped together on the back to make a 24" x 36" composition. Cut the perforated edge off your paper **before** the due date.

Assignment 4

Interior/Exterior Drawing

This assignment will begin with a class discussion and examples from other artists. From there, we will do some interior/exterior thumbnail sketching in class on campus.

You will be working at home from life in your own environment, and in class from photographic references. Be sure to have adequate full-color photographic references to work from in class, as this is part of your grade.

Use pastels on two pieces of 18" x 24" charcoal paper taped together on the back to make a 24" x 36" composition. Cut the perforated edge off your paper **before** the due date.

Assignment 5

Due October 23 Photo's for Figurative Drawing. Figurative Drawing with Unconventional Viewpoint (color optional)

Working from a photograph of a clothed figure, either yourself or someone you know, create a drawing that is viewed from an unconventional viewpoint (worm's eye or bird's eye view). Use pastels with a monochromatic color palette – that is one color of your choice mixed with black and white. If you do not have an appropriate photograph to work from, I can bring my digital camera to class and we can work together to take a photograph. Include the head and the body at least to the waist. Although this is a monochromatic assignment, you are encouraged to use both warms and cools of a color family, which we will discuss in class.

Use pastels on two pieces of 18" x 24" charcoal paper taped together on the back to make a 24" x 36" composition. Cut the perforated edge off your paper **before** the due date.

Assignments 6 and 7 are open. You may use any drawing medium or combination of media on any kind of paper. Drawing media must be dry and includes pastels, charcoal, pen, and colored pencil. Please submit a written typed statement of your plan for your fifth and sixth drawings to me at the beginning of the class on November 16th. Include the medium, size, and subjust matter for the piece. Please also include your technical goals for these paintings. Be as specific as possible. Please bring your materials with you to our class meetings so that you can work on these assignments for the remainder of class periods. You will also need to work on

them outside of class. These assignments may be connected if you wish, such as "Sister Pieces" or as in a triptych.

Remember, these are your last assignments, and it is important to finish the semester much stronger than you started!

Written plan for assignments 6 and 7 are due at the beginning of class November 4. Assignment 6 is due November 25.

Assignment 7 is due December 11.

Go to the library and find an issue of the contemporary art magazine Art News or Art in America from this or a recent month. Flip through the entire magazine. Go back to the article that struck you the most. Write a 2-page personal reaction paper in response to the article you have chosen. Include a brief summary of the article. This an opportunity to speak your mind about what you read. Be honest and thoughtful.

Please use 12-point type, double-spaced, with one inch margins.

This is a college paper, so be as professional as you can.
