All quizzes and the mid-term exam will be take home. The test format will be short answer and multiple choice. The final will be conducted in class.

The students will maintain a current event file containing news clippings over the course of the semester placing at least ten subject related article read each week into the file.

Students are required to conduct a field observation report. Students will observe court, participate in a police ride-a-long or other field activity as approved by the instructor. The assignment will be due by April 19th. The paper will be 3 to 5 pages (typed & double spaced) long and will describe the observation activity and will tie the observations to topics discussed in the class.
