Course Title: Introduction to Criminal Justice

Course Description:

This course provides an overview of the criminal justice system in the United States. Students will be exposed to the system's components: law enforcement, courts, and corrections from historical, theoretical, and philosophical perspectives.

Course Objectives:

- Students will recognize the historical perspective of the system and view the system as a dynamic function of society.
- Students will determine their learning styles and the implications of this style regarding their success as a college student.
- Students will discuss issues related to cultural diversity, prejudice, ethics and professionalism on the criminal justice system.
- Students will conduct a field observation and communicate with criminal justice professionals.
- Students will deliver an oral presentation on their field work experience.
- Students will research current events related to the criminal justice system, prepare reports on such. And discuss views that may contradict their own, understand that objectivity, critical thinking, openness to new ideas, and opinions are critical to the success of the criminal justice system.

Evaluation Procedures

Your final grade will be determined by a combination of quizzes, exams, current events file and class participation.

Quizzes: All quizzes are take-home and the format is multiple choice. The value of each quiz is based upon the number of chapters covered in the quiz. Each

chapter is worth 5 points, so, if a quiz is on two chapters, then it is worth 10 points toward your final grade. **Late quizzes will only be accepted with the prior approval of the instructor.**

Current Event Papers: For each article the student will write out a brief summary of the article, an explanation of what the student learned from the article, and how the subject of the article is related to the course. The writing assignment is to be typed, double spaced and in 12 point new times roman font with standard margins. The format for this paper will be provided in class.

Field Observation Report: Students are required to conduct a field observation report. Students will observe court; participate in a police ride-a-long or other field activity as approved by the instructor. The assignment will be due by November 15th. The paper will be 3 to 5 pages (typed & double spaced) long and will describe the observation activity, what they learned from the observation, and will tie the observations to topics discussed in the class.

Report Presentation: Students will give a presentation of their field observation report to the class. This is to be relatively informal and should last 3 to 5 minutes.

Grades: All grades will be posted on Blackboard in real time. The grades will be expressed in a point value. For example: an exam is worth 10 points, a grade of between 0 and 10 points will be recorded. The total amount of points earned during the semester will correspond to the grade scale listed below.
