Overview:

This course will explore American History from Reconstruction [1865] through the first decade of the 21st-Century [2010]. Utilizing an inter-disciplinary approach this course will incorporate examples of literature, art, music, film, and material culture to examine American identity and memory. Since the history of the United States is diverse in nature this course will consider the many facets of America's past such as social class, gender, race, ethnicity, politics, and culture. Readings and discussions are designed to develop self-confidence, critical thinking, and oral and written communication skills. Ask questions, debate, and join the conversation, as participation will reflect favorable on your final grade!

Explore each text, examine assigned readings thoroughly, and focus upon the themes and events that interest you the most.

They will not be accepted 24 hours after they are due.
