# HSE K171 Death and Dying

## Overview

This course is designed to familiarize you with attitudes toward death, dying, grief, and loss. You will have opportunities to understand approaching death from several perspectives. The issues will include the organizational context of dying, cross cultural studies of death, and the personal struggle of terminally ill people and their families.

## Goals

- Understand societies' definitions of death and dying from a variety of perspectives.
- Challenge and increase your own awareness of how personal attitudes and beliefs about death and dying develop, and influence the grief process.
- Understand the issues facing people with life threatening illnesses and their families.
- Describe the death and grief concepts and rituals as viewed from a variety of cultural and spiritual perspectives.
- Increase awareness and competence in successfully working through death, loss and grief.

One or two missed classes will not result in any kind of grading penalty, but excessive absences (more than three) will most likely impact your work negatively.

#### Academic Dishonesty

Plagiarism is the unacknowledged use of another person's words or ideas in your writing. Conscious plagiarism is an unacceptable academic behavior. *Any instance of conscious plagiarism will result in a "zero" for that assignment. More than one instance will result in an "F" grade for the course.* Plagiarism by omission or "unconscious" plagiarism will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.
