Course Description

This upper level course introduces the major theories of personality with an emphasis on: psychoanalytic theory and its descendants, dispositional theory, biological theories, motivation theories, cognitive theories, phenomenological (experiential) theories and cultural theory. The research methods used to formulate and test these theories are examined. The course addresses *how* we know what we know as well as *what* we know about a particular body of knowledge.

Learning Objectives

What is personality? What makes us different from one another and where do these differences come from? Do these differences persist over time? How do we scientifically investigate personality? What are the consequences of personality theories? How do you respond to the question, "Tell me about yourself?"

This course is designed to introduce you the broad range of topics germane to personality psychology. We will explore how classic theories and contemporary data inform our knowledge of personality. The course begins with the research methods used to investigate personality theories. Thereafter, we will explore the major personality theorists. You will articulate the salient characteristics of the different theoretical approaches to personality psychology, and evaluate the limitations of these approaches. The course may provide insight into the eternal human question, "Who am I?" (Hartung, 1998) The course emphasizes analyzing, listening, questioning and collaborative learning. Evaluative thinking and the scientific bases for personality theories are stressed.

Class time will be used in combinations of: debate, film, didactic lecture, writing, Internet exploration, and small group work. It is necessary for you to keep current on global, national and local news as such events are often discussed in light of persons' psychological functioning. You are encouraged to ask questions about what you are learning, write about it, relate it to past experiences and apply it to your daily lives. Learning is a *cooperative joint venture*. *Together* we can make learning a most meaningful experience (Hartung, 1998).

The Reading Assignments

Please be aware each chapter contains complex theoretical material and research data. Plan and manage your time accordingly. The weekly reading assignments will follow the syllabus for the most part and reflect the five major domains of personality theory. You are expected to come to each class having read the assignment *and having thought critically about it*. This will prepare you for debates, small group work and written reflection.

Attendance and Participation

If a student misses an exam for an unacceptable reason, a 0 will be averaged into the student's grade for the missed exam. Make-up exams will be given only to students who have contacted the instructor in advance of the exam and have an acceptable reason. It is your responsibility to contact the Instructor in order to petition for a make-up exam.

- Produce college level writing

Systematic Inquiry: Understand how social science research methods are used in personality psychology:

- Acquire knowledge about academic inquiry appropriate to the field of personality psychology
- Develop an understanding of how scientific methodology is applied to the understanding of personality psychology
- Acquire knowledge about men and women whose research and/or theories have made significant contributions to the field of personality psychology.
