-Course Outline

Over the course of this semester, we will study the fundamental issues of drawing. We will cover such issues as line and contour, value, composition, mark-making, perspective and anatomy. Students will investigate these issues through a variety of means, including still life, architectural studies, figure studies, and abstraction. Students will create approximately one drawing per class period, though some drawings may be extended for more than one class period. Students will take part in class critiques of their work periodically through the semester.

As this is a beginning level drawing class, I will strive to create an atmosphere where students can feel safe to take chances with their work, and not feel intimidated by trying something new. Struggling in the beginning is normal; just remember I do not expect you to be perfect. I only ask you to try your hardest.

In case of emergency, please follow the emergency procedure as discussed on the first day of class and as posted in the classroom.

-LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of Drawing I students should:

Practice patience, persistence, and careful observation to successfully create drawings.

Demonstrate familiarity with the fundamentals of drawing so they can use it as an expressive tool, including the construction of effective compositions.

Understand linear and atmospheric perspective, creating drawings that correctly utilize these skills.

Be able to create a representational drawing from observation better than they could before taking the course.

Be familiar with various techniques and styles that can be obtained through the use of both charcoal and pencil.

Be able to critique a work of art using an informed visual vocabulary.

-Course Materials

A kit containing all materials (except for newsprint) is available at the bookstore. Addition materials most likely will be necessary during the semester

- -One 18"by 24" newsprint pad*
- -pencils, 2H, 3H, 4B, 6B
- -one ebony pencil
- -white vinyl eraser
- -one medium hardness charcoal pencil
- -One 18"by24" charcoal or drawing paper pad, any dry media pad
- -Vine or willow charcoal*, hard, medium, and soft, at least 12 sticks. -One White vinyl eraser*
- -Pencil sharpener, x-acto, or razor blade
- -Spray fixative (do not bring to class), aerosol hairspray will also work but can yellow
- -Mirror, no smaller than a hand mirror. A small mirror that can stand on its own is ideal

Optional but may be helpful:

This class can be messy, you may want to wear an old t-shirt or clothes you do not mind getting charcoal on. Portfolio of some kind, large enough to hold 18"by24" drawings Masking tape

Kneaded eraser

Chamois, rags, or paper towels

Something to carry your materials in

Where to get materials: the bookstore or any art supply/craft supply store.

-Grading

Grading will be based on how well I feel you have grasped the concepts we are studying. I will not be grading individual drawings done during class; you will get credit for having done the drawing(s) for that day.

Homework drawings, the mid-semester project and final project however will be given a letter grade. This grade will be based on your grasp of the concept, craft, and spending the required amount of time on the given assignment. Homework assignments will be given out once a week, unless otherwise noted, a given assignment will be due the week following it has been given to you. You should plan on spending one to two hours (depending on assignment) on each homework assignment.

If you ever have a question regarding how you are doing in the class, please feel free to speak to me about it before or after class. Your level of class participation and your attendance will also be reflected in your grade.

I will explain the contents of your portfolio as the time to hand them in approaches.

The breakdown- Classwork, participation/effort given to class 25%, midsemester project 25%, homework assignments 25%, Final project 25%.

-Class Participation

Students are expected to participate in all classroom activities, critiques, and discussions. Part of your grade will reflect your participation in class. Please feel free to ask questions, discussion will be a very important part of this class, and I hope to create an open environment in which students feel free to ask questions.
