Purpose:

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Description:

This course provides an introduction to the history of art from prehistoric era in Europe through to the mid-15th century and from a global perspective. It includes an introduction to African, Islamic, Meso-American and Asian art prior to the 15th-century. Major works in many media including painting, sculpture, and architecture will be covered. Regardless of whether the work is accessible and easy to admire or difficult and not readily understood, students will understand how to evaluate works of art not only for their beauty, but for other intrinsic values such as power of expression and boldness of communication.

The subject will be taught as follows:

There will be one discussion forum response due once every week. Assignments will be due once every two to three-weeks. There will be two or three Assessments (Quizzes) per semester and you will be given a study guide and one-week to complete the Assessment. *Assessments were called Quizzes in former editions of Blackboard. There is no mid term or final exam, although there is a final project due the last day of class.

This a project, writing and discussion-intensive class. The emphasis is on problem-based and experiential assessments, visual thinking and creative problem solving. For example, you will be asked to go out into your community and visually document and write about examples of specific artistic genres, motifs and styles. You will create a blog and your own art exhibition. You will be the author of creative writing pieces that involve curatorial methods of writing and critique. There are only 2 or 3 traditional "tests" (quizzes) per semester. You will be encouraged to express personal opinion through well-crafted discussion posts.

- Required textbook readings will introduce terminology, key art works, and methods of classification of art objects.
- Discussion Topics are stand-ins for in-class discussions, students express opinions and "listen to" and respond to classmates through instructor facilitated topics.
- Problem-based assignments will develop skills in interpreting and analyzing works of art
- Assessments will test your ability to identify an artwork by title, region, culture and date.

Prerequisite: English 101

No prior knowledge of art history is necessary or expected; but the ability to write at the college level is required to keep up with the workload of this course.

Grade points

Grading is cumulative and you need 1000 points to earn the letter grade of an A. Each discussion post is worth 25 to 50 points, each assignment 75 to 150 and assessments points vary between 50 and 125 points. You are accumulating 1000 points with each completed "assessment" (assignment, discussion, assessment(Quiz). Extra Credit points are earned by responding to peer question in General Course Questions and exceptional quality of work for submitted course work.

It your responsibility to know what course work is due and the due date. You are also responsible for checking the comment field for personalized feedback once the professor grades your work. The instructor may change the point value of any assessment at her discretion. Non-completed course work will remain blank in MyGrades.

Grade turnaround

Weekly Discussions threads are graded within 48-72 hours of your post. Assessments require manual correction by professor and those corrections are done within 14 days of due date. Assignments are graded within 7-14 days of the due date and there is a 24-hour grace period from midnight of the due date.

Grade Chart

Discussions and Assignments are assigned a numeric value between 50 and 150 points. Once you achieve 900 points, you have earned an A. There is an **Extra Credit column** in MyGrades whereby I allot points for the following achievements: responding to peers in General Course Questions; exceeding grade rubrics for Discussions or Assignments; contributing a URL to the Art History "delicious" social bookmarking. (Extra Credit per instructor's discretion)
