REQUIRED MATERIALS:

• TEXT - Essentials of Management, 8e by Andrew J. DuBrin; Published by CENGAGE Learning

PREREQUISITE: Placement score indicating ENG K101 or completion of ENG K100 with a "C" grade or better.

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>: A study of the fundamentals of management theory and practice with an emphasis on their application in the global marketplace. This course uses case analysis as the primary means of introducing the student to the terminology, language, practice and application of the material presented in the text.

<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES and OUTCOMES</u> – upon completion of the course the student should be able to:

- identify and apply the appropriate text language, terms and concepts to the case;
- identify factual content in the case;
- infer relevant content from the case's description of the situation, personalities and issues;
- identify additional, desirable data and information applicable to addressing case issues; and
- define an appropriate course of action to address the issues(s) raised by the case;

- WRITTEN CASE ANALYSIS you will be assigned two cases to analyze and submit a written report. The assignment will be random and is described in a supplemental handout (see J. C. Penney case handout). Each report will be graded separately and each will count for five (5) points toward your final grade.
