

Introduction to Criminal Justice CJS K101 CRN 10386

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Course description:

This course provides an overview of the criminal justice system in the United States. Students will be exposed to the system's components: law enforcement, courts, and corrections from historical, theoretical, and philosophical perspectives. Students will have the opportunity to interact with criminal justice professionals and be challenged in both reading and writing.

Course objectives:

Each participant will be able to identify the various system components, their respective participants, and how they operate independently, as well as interdependently, within the greater system.

Bright-line historical court decisions which shape the operating structure(s) within the system will be identified and exemplified through case review and group discussion.

Participants will be required to express (through written and oral reflection) both personal and educated opinion, regarding a number of current event topics highlighting given Criminal Justice processes.

Participants will be required to show proficiency in knowledge of the course materials presented, through both written and oral feedback tools.
