COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a continuation of Sign Language I. American Sign Language (ASL) is stressed. Knowledge of issues surrounding deafness is given some emphasis. (Course does not fulfill foreign language requirement.)

This interactive course will focus on expanding the students' ability to communicate in American Sign Language (ASL) through classroom instruction and participation as well as out of class readings and practice and required visitations. The instructional approach will be holistic, exploring all aspects of the language – mechanics, culture, environmental concerns and interpreting.

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of Sign language II, students will be competent, receptively and expressively, in the following areas by:

- Demonstrate the ability to select, produce, and use appropriate sign vocabulary for clear and accurate communication.
- Apply the appropriate grammar and syntax by using facial expression and body language to communicate in sign language effectively.
- Further Develop understanding of Deaf culture, differences between Deaf and hearing cultures and insight of the experiences of being deaf when communicating in a hearing world.

MATERIALS

- Required Text: Learning American Sign Language (2nd edition) Tom Humphries & Carol Padden.
- Supplemental materials will be provided by the instructor.
- Videos and supplementary materials used in class and/or available through TRCC library.
- Required readings located on blackboard.

PROCEDURE

- 1 Classroom instruction of language component.
- 2 Modeling of target language.
- 3 Practice using target language in and outside of class.
- 4 Interaction with native users of target language.
- 5 In-class discussions, activities and presentations.
- 6 Off campus activities with written papers.
- 7 Quizzes & Exams

METHOD OF EVALUATION

Students gain proficiency / mastery at different rates. Each student is capable of achieving proficiency / mastery in ASL and will be given every opportunity to do so. All assessments are cumulative.

1 Classroom Participation – 25%

In order to learn sign Language, one MUST participate in using it. I recognize that there are extenuating circumstances, if there is an issue with being able to attend class, please contact me. Attendance will be recorded and those who repeatedly miss or leave class early will be subject to deductions in their grade.

2 Exams – 25% (Midterm and Final)

One exam which will be cumulative and interactive among students in the class. Both the expressive and the receptive skills of students will be tested. Each exam will also include a written section on theory and Deaf Culture/History. Missed exam can be rescheduled at the discretion of the instructor.

3 Presentations – 15%

Two activities where students will demonstrate their expressive and receptive skills. Quality signing is an important component of presentations. Students will be graded on the following:

- Clarity and fluency of signs
- Choice of signs
- Correct usage of grammar / syntax
- Appropriate use of facial expressions and body language
- Clear formation and appropriate use of fingerspelling
- Confidence.

Each student must contribute 2 minutes of material.

Can elect to video in advance. Topics will be given in advance.

4 Quizzes - 20%

Quizzes will be used to asses your weekly progress and to show you where you need to focus your energy. There will be 10 quizzes. Each exam will include a signing portion and or questions on other aspects of correct usage of ASL.

5 Outside visits to deaf functions - 15%

Each student will be required to visit two functions where deaf people are present. Each visitation must be at least 1½ hours long. Following the visitation, a paper is to be written describing your experience at the site. Each paper will be 2 pages typed or neatly written using the following guidelines:

- Each paper is a representation of YOUR thoughts. YOUR feelings or beliefs, YOUR impressions, YOUR agreements / disagreements and why.
- Is this new or old information for you?
- How has this experience / activity impacted you?
- How will you use this information?
- Does this information / activity change the way that you think or support it? How and why?

^{**} Papers that do not satisfy the above requirements will be given back to the student to redo and will receive no credit until the criteria are satisfactorily completed.

MISCELLANEOUS EXPECTATIONS AND INFORMATION:

ATTENDANCE:

Class begins promptly at 6:30 p.m. and procedures will not be delayed to accommodate late comers. Students are expected to attend all classes. If you choose not to attend it will affect your grade. Consistent practice of using American Sign Language is of utmost importance if students are to master the language. Therefore, students will be expected to spend time outside of class practicing the language of native signers so that they can practice what they learn in class. Any public library will have or be able to obtain videos and books on ASL through inter-library loan.

EARLY WARNING

If you are having ANY difficult for any reason, please see me as early as possible to discuss ways of assisting you to be successful in this class. Any student demonstrating a grade lower than average will be contacted by instructor.

PLAGERISM

In order to support the process of promoting academic integrity at Three Rivers, any student who plagiarizes work from an outside source or from another student in the class will receive a failing grade for the assignment.
