Course Description: This course will focus on the fundamentals of speech communication. Students will learn to listen to, prepare, deliver and critique various types of verbal presentations. Emphasis will be placed on organization as well as on actual speech delivery. Verbal and non-verbal communication aspects will be addressed.

Learning Outcomes for COM 173: Upon successful completion of COM 173, students will be able to:

- > Compose and deliver several primary types of speeches of increasing length and complexity (Introduction, Entertaining, Informative, Motivational, and Persuasive Speeches), representing an increasing development of critical thinking skills and delivery sophistication.
- > Develop, research, and compose speech outlines according to formal outlining techniques.
- > Analyze, recognize, and incorporate the appropriate, formal argument models and patterns of logic for each given speech.
- > Devise, compose, and utilize appropriate speaking notes to facilitate and enhance the delivery of speeches.
- > Utilize both verbal and non-verbal strategies to effectively communicate with audience during speech presentations.
- > Understand the importance of audience analysis and demonstrate an ability to be aware of and utilize audience feedback during speech presentations.
- > Use audio and visual aids, including PowerPoint, where appropriate, to enhance speech presentations.
- > Document information obtained through research using MLA format.
- > Analyze and provide productive, useful, and constructive critique of peer speech presentations.

Procedures: Lectures will be minimal---student involvement and participation will be maximal. Students will be responsible for the following:

1. (70-75% of the grade) Individual/ Group Presentations (8 per student):

Introductory Speech (1 minute)
Object Presentation (2 minutes)
Family Roots Presentation (5 minutes)
Group Chapter Presentation (15-20 minutes)
Informative Speech (6-10 minutes)
Persuasive Speech (6-10 minutes)
Two Impromptu Speeches (3 minutes)

Informal In-Class Speaking Activities(various lengths)

2. (10% of the grade) Critique Activities (oral and written)

3. (15% of the grade) Tests (1 quiz, 1 midterm, and 1 final exam)

4. (5% of the grade) Attendance/Being Ready on Assigned Dates

The above percentages are approximate

Grading Method: In this course, you will have the opportunity to participate in activities designed to improve your communication skills. All the activities will have a point value. List of these activities and point values are attached. In order to participate in the activities, you must be present in class the day of the activity. Because communication involves your interaction with others, *no class activities can be made up outside of class*, and *no extra work is assigned as make-up work for any missed activities*.

Written assignments handed in late receive no credit! NO EXCEPTIONS

Anyone who does not come to class on their assigned speech/presentation day (without **first** having put a message on my voice mail or email **prior to class**) or comes to class with an excuse for not presenting their talk that day (and does not let me know **prior** to my entering the room)...will automatically have 10 of the potential points deducted from their grade. **NO EXCEPTIONS**.

All class days after your appointed day until you actually give your talk are considered days that your speech presentation is due, and an additional 10 of the potential points will be deducted for each class (missed or attended) until the speech/presentation is given. Above referred to "prior excuses" are allowed only once a semester.

Possible: 600 points. A 45-point cushion is built into the final grading system in case of a missed class, poor performance on a test or presentation, etc.
