Course Description: Public Speaking introduces students to the principles and basic skills of effective oral communication. The course familiarizes students with the strategies and techniques that enable successful and persuasive public speech. Student will research, compose, and deliver speeches of increasing complexity and sophistication. Through lecture, discussion, reading, student presentations, writing, and instructor/peer critique, students gain an understanding of how communication happens and how citizens participate in public discourses. The course also exposes students to the rhetorical dimensions of many types of public speech and teaches them to be more critical listeners who can respond rhetorically to complex issues and ideas.

1. Demonstrate, describe, and apply an understanding of the relevant principles of speech communication, reasoning, and argumentation.
2. Critically evaluate examples of public discourse.

5. Demonstrate an appreciation of the relationship of speech communication to society.
