Course Description:

This intensive course leads students from the sentence to the paragraph to the short essay. Students learn to write short essays based on personal experience, reading and observation. Writing is taught as a means of thinking critically and as a vehicle for developing, organizing, supporting and refining ideas. Students learn the stages of the writing process from inventing to drafting and revision. The course develops students' writing in narrative, descriptive and expository essays. Within this context, sentence and paragraph skills are stressed. Attention is given to spelling, punctuation, capitalization, and grammar and word choice. Organization and the development of ideas and information literacy skills are introduced.
