Course Description:

In this intensive course, students will work extensively on the sentence level and paragraph skills of beginner/high beginner grammatical structures through speaking, listening, and writing exercises and language learning games. They will also generate personal writing through narration, description, and opinion. Students will be introduced to the writing process and oral reading strategies.

Attendance/Late Work:

As this is an intensive course, regular attendance is required. If you miss more than two classes, the instructor *will* deduct points for each absence. Late work will not be accepted without the permission of the instructor.

Grading:

Grading will be based on the following criteria: Below 59% = F, 60-69% = D, 70-79 = C, 80-89% = B, above 90% = A. Grading will be determined as follows: All assignments including quizzes, homework, writing assignments, and tests: 85% + Final Exam: 15%.

- 4. Write a paragraph about their daily activities and habits.
- 5. Write paragraphs of description, narration, and opinion.
- 6. Answer comprehension questions in complete sentences both orally and in writing.
- 7. Identify and utilize the basic grammatical structures and vocabulary of reading texts.
