Course Purpose

Art History is a Humanities course offered under the Humanities Department at Three Rivers Community College and The Consortium of Community Colleges for the State of Connecticut.

- 1. We value critical thinking, problem-solving and oral discussion (using the Discussion Forum tool), with an emphasis on the exchange of ideas and developing opinions grounded in research, observation and authentic experience.
- 2. We encourage student-centered learning that guides you toward in-depth observation, research and study that will foster your ability to form opinions and conclusions uniquely your own.
- 3. We expect you to follow academic ethics related to the fair and free use of copy written material, and to embrace your responsibility as a Writer that is to argue fairly, to use language fairly, and to use online image and textual sources fairly, and to avoid plagiarism.

Course Overview

Art History is a chronological course that will cover thousands of years of art making. Starting with the art of Paleolithic Europe weekly and bi-weekly modules will introduce the student to major art historical eras according to geographic region: The Near East, Africa and Egypt, Ancient Greece and Rome. The course will end with an overview of Jewish, Christian and Islamic Art.

The subject will be taught as follows:

1. Required textbook readings and assigned research at the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Curatorial departments (www.metmuseum.org) will introduce terminology, key art objects, and methods of classification of art objects.

- 2. Slide sheets, digital slides, interactive Timelines, Regions and Maps and Vodcasts will provide study tools and aides for assignments related to visual analysis and slide identification of specific art objects and their corresponding geographies and dates.
- 3. Discussion Topics are stand-ins for class discussions and allow students to talk art, express opinions, test a hypothesis, and in general "listen to" and respond to classmates through instructor facilitated topics.
- 4. Writing and Problem-based assignments will hone skills in writing about, interpreting and analyzing works of art.
- 5. Assessments will test you ability to identify an artwork by title, region, culture and date.

Prerequisite: English 101

No prior knowledge of art history is necessary; writing at the college level is required to keep up with the workload of this course.

A course outline is provided. As can be seen, there will be a mixture of textbook reading, multimedia, written assignments, quizzes, discussions and a tracing assignment.

Expectations

- Proper English Grammar and punctuation is required for all communication: this includes Email, Discussion Posts and Assignments.
- Confidence writing 500 to 1200 word essays at the college level
- A reliable computer equipped with current operating system
- Expect some technical snafus with an online class
- Ability to read and follow instructions
- Comfortable reading up to 42 pages of the textbook per week
- Willingness to "read" supplementary assignments
- Employ a respectful tone with both professor and classmates
