Course Description:

This course traces the origins of human beings from solitary nomads to complex multicultural societies. We will travel around the globe to visit early China, Celtic Europe, and the first civilizations in America. We will see the rise of the Persian Empire, Greek Empire, and the Han Empire. Along with the political expansion of these states, we will witness the founding of the most influential religions of our time Confucianism, Daoism, Christianity, Islam, Judaism and Buddhism. We will conclude with the European maritime revolution.

Purpose:

This course deals with the major events of world history, with a special emphasis on events in Asia, the Middle East, Africa, and Latin America.

Learning Goal:

At the end of the course, students will understand, articulate and synthesize the development of ancient and medieval world societies.

Course Outline

Although the list of required text book readings and a general outline of when the assignments are due is presented below, it is very important to understand that the specific daily assignments and submission dates are listed on the Calendar. Every assignment or link to an assignment is listed on the Calendar, and links provide easy access to all homework assignments, practice work, review quizzes, and tests. Additionally, the Calendar serves as a guideline for the reading assignments in the sense that it will break down the reading into smaller segments. It is designed to serve as a guide only. Each of you can arrange your schedules to complete the readings at your own convenience. However, the submission dates for your work are accurate, and material is penalized if it is late.

Late Work Policy

I will break down the course into three segments (approximately every five weeks) and the day before Test[1] and Test[2] will serve as the closing date for the first

two-thirds of the course. The late policy is very simple. If you miss the assigned due date, but complete the assignment before the end of the segment, you will NOT lose any points off the grade. If you hand in material sometime in the middle of the next segment, you will lose ten points off the late assignment, and if you hand in material from the first segment during the third segment you will lose twenty points off that assignment.

There is no late date for Review Quizzes or TESTS. If you miss any of these you will receive a zero. However, I do understand that unusual and unforeseen circumstances do occur. If you are confronted by such situations, please feel free to speak with me before the test date.

The absolute deadline for any late work is May 10, 2012 because I will need the time to correct the submissions and meet my deadline for submitting grades. Thus, any outstanding material not submitted by midnight, on Thursday, May 10, 2012 will receive a zero.

Assessments

There will be three tests, numerous quizzes, practice work, and homework assignments throughout the sixteen-week semester.

Each <u>test</u> is a combination of multiple-choice type questions and essays (see the calendar for the specific due dates). The <u>tests</u> are open book, but they <u>are timed</u>. Failure to complete a test by the due date will result in a zero.

The traditional <u>quizzes</u> appear more frequently at the beginning of the semester (see the McGraw-Hill web site for the specific due dates) and often consist of multiple-choice questions designed to assess the assigned reading for the class. These <u>quizzes</u> are open book. Additionally, failure to complete the quizzes by the due date will result in the implementation of the Late Policy (see above).

The <u>practice work</u> is designed to serve as a way for you to review the reading assignments. Very often the Review assignments consist of roughly ten to fifteen fill-in-the-blank or matching-style questions, or written responses to questions that require a summary of the material. The objective is to proffer reinforcement of your understanding of the material

in the text (see the McGraw-Hill web site for the specific due dates). You may use your book to complete the practice work. These assignments are NOT limited by time. Again, failure to complete a review exercise by the due date will result in the implementation of the Late Policy (see above).

Finally, the <u>homework assignments</u> on map skills, image analysis, or a reading, etc. consist of responses to a variety of supplemental materials or web sites. Among the offerings, but not limited to these, are exercises or online interactive experiences (see the McGraw-Hill web site for the specific assignments and due dates). Again, failure to complete any of the assignments by the due date will result in the implementation of the Late Policy (see above).
