COURSE DESCRIPTION

You can expect regular reading and writing assignments along with classroom discussion as you investigate how to be successful in this new environment.

GRADING CRITERIA

This course demands active involvement in learning experiences accompanied by reading and writing activities that capture those experiences. The nature of the course content requires critical thinking skills to be learned, developed, and applied. The following criteria will be used in evaluating your grade:

Participation - Students are expected to come to class prepared and actively participate in discussions and group work in a way that enhances and adds positively to the learning environment. Civil tolerance and acceptance of other student's thoughts, ideas and beliefs is expected.

Oral Presentations/Group Project - Over the course of the semester each student will make at least three (3) oral presentations. Your grade with this criterion will be determined by the Semester Goal or Group Project Presentation that you will give at the end of the semester.

Test/Quizzes - During the semester there will be four (4) tests all scheduled in advance, and at least one (1) unscheduled quiz. The tests and quiz will be composed of the following: multiple choice, true-false, short answer, matching, and essay questions. If for any reason you are absent on the day of test or quiz, you can schedule a time to make-up the test/quiz in the testing center on campus. Students must make-up the test before the next class following the missed class when the quiz was given. It is the sole responsibility of the student to contact the instructor and make arrangements to make up the test/quiz.

TRCC Function Participation - Each student will participate in at least one (1) TRCC sponsored event or function and write a reaction paper on the function. **In advance and for approval**, the student must submit in writing the event/function that will be attended for the TRCC Function Participation assignment.

Educational Plan - This four part assignment will help you design a realistic plan for accomplishing your coursework and educational goals. You will learn and experience the college student/advisor relationship by working with your advisor to complete this plan. Details of the assignment will be passed out in class.
