INTERMEDIATE ACCOUNTING I

(ACCT 211, 3 credits) Monday 6:30-9:15 Spring 2011 D 203

Three Rivers Community-Technical College Norwich, CT 06360

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an intensive study of financial accounting **theory** focusing on revenue and expense recognition and the valuation and disclosure of financial statement elements, as well as preparing, understanding and analyzing financial statements. Prerequisite: ACCT 112.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS AND REQUIRED MATERIALS

The primary method of instruction will be classroom lectures and group problem solving.

Required text: Intermediate Accounting, 13th edition, Kieso, Weygandt & Warfield, Wiley & Sons, 2010. Supplements: Study Guide (Optional) Calculator

LEARNING OUTCOMES AND OBJECTIVES

- Understanding of conceptual framework and fundamental concepts
- Working knowledge of accounting cycle
- Working knowledge of GAAP
- Ability to calculate accrual to cash conversions
- Prepare trial balance and extract data to prepare financial statements
- Working knowledge of the Sarbanes Oxley Act
- Ability to analyze financial statements

GRADING AND MAKE-UP POLICIES AND OVERALL EVALUATION

The grading policy will be the same as stated in the manual of Policy and Procedures on Grades and Quality Points. Four tests will be given that will count towards 80% of your final grade. A writing assignment will be worth 8 exam grade points. Failure to complete the writing assignment will have a negative 20 point impact on grade. There will be 2 accounting projects which will be worth 20% of the final grade. At the discretion of your instructor, failure to complete all homework assignments and lack of positive class participation can have a negative impact on your grade.

If a test is missed, a makeup will not be allowed. A cumulative exam will be offered to those students who have missed a test or are unhappy about a test grade. The exam will count as the missed test or replace your lowest test grade.

WRITING ASSIGNMENT

Each student is required to write a 2-3 page paper on a section of the Sarbanes Oxley Act. Further guidance in class will be provided.

PROJECT #1

Each student is required to prepare a 2-year final adjusted trial balance. From that information, financial statements will be prepared. The trial balance should contain approximately 20 accounts. Remember, these accounts will be needed to prepare an Income Statement, Balance Sheet, and Statement of Cash Flows. And of course, pursuant to GAAP, the trial balance will be prepared on the accrual basis method of accounting.

PROJECT #2

Group Project – Each Group will be responsible for analyzing the financial statements of a publicly traded company, and present the findings to the class. Be creative, and integrate as many accounting concepts as possible during your presentation. Each group will be graded on (1^{st}) accounting concepts and (2^{nd}) creativity.
