Journal Assignments: (Specific questions are suggestions of topics you could cover, but you don't need to answer each question. You just need to discuss the topic given for each journal.)

Journal 2: Pick a favorite text or image (and a text can be almost anything-newspaper, tv show, song lyric) and perform some analysis on it. Use your reading from your handbook as your guide.
