UNDERSTANDING SEXUAL ABUSE

Course Description:

This course is designed to introduce the student to the problem of sexual abuse and assault, the psychology of the offender, the impact on the victim; and provide a preliminary orientation to sex offender and victim treatment.

Required Text(s):

Reserved Reading Assignments in Learning Resource Center (Library)

Assignments:

- 1. Interview a professional, actively involved in the provision of services or treatment for children in your community. These professionals (mandated reporters) may include: social workers, police, medical personnel, day care providers, therapists, teachers, etc. Your report should be based on a set of fact-finding questions relating to their work with children when the child sexual abuse is suspected in their professional capacity. The report should be no less than three (3) typed pages. Due Date: October 3, 2008
- 2. Journal Each student is to read ten (10) articles on Reserve in the Mohegan Library and type a one (1) page summary of the article. Due Date: October 31, 2008
- 3. Mid-Term Examination Date: November 7, 2008
- 4. Position Paper on relevant issue relating to child sexual abuse. Due Date: December 5, 2008
