Course Description

This course is an intensive introduction to representational painting with acrylics. Students are given a firm foundation in painting through an introduction to the materials of painting and thorough study of color theory and color mixing. The knowledge of color theory will be put into practice with the painting of the still life. A variety of exercises and techniques will be explored including preparing different surfaces on which to paint as well as aesthetic explorations. It will be emphasized that the skills of drawing are an integral painting tool.

Course Overview

By the end of this course, students should have a working knowledge of color theory. Once this knowledge is obtained, painting from observation will be the focus through the use of still life. Readings from the textbook will be done outside of class and reading assignments should be complete at the beginning of class. On their due date, assignments should be complete at the beginning of class. Students should develop and utilize an informed visual vocabulary. Students will gain knowledge of art history and contemporary art through presentations and the research project. You should plan to spend a minimum of 8 hours per week on your work outside of class. Those that put forth effort in this class will inevitably show improvement in their work as the class progresses.

Course Outcomes

Upon successful completion of Painting I students should:

- 1) Practice patience, persistence, and careful observation to successfully create paintings.
- 2) Demonstrate familiarity with the fundamentals of painting to use it as an expressive tool, including the construction of effective compositions.
- 3) Demonstrate an understanding of the color wheel and be able to effectively mix colors.
- 4) Be able to create a representational painting from observation better than they could before taking the course.
- 5) Demonstrate familiarity with studio procedures pertaining to painting including stretching and priming a canvas as well as studio maintenance and safety.
- 6) Be able to thoughtfully critique a work of art using an informed visual vocabulary and be able to engage in an artistic dialogue.
- 7) Complete an artist research project, identifying the artist's works within its historical, cultural and aesthetic contexts.

Instructional Materials

Required Textbook: Color by Betty Edwards, ISBN: 1-58542-219-3 Supplies as outlined on pages 5-6 of this syllabus.

Research Project

One 2-page research project in the form of an outline is required for this course. Students should use the library's research guides that are listed here: <u>http://www.trcc.commnet.edu/library/Guides/artpage.htm</u>. A discussion will be held on the due date where the student will give a summary of his/her research.

Digication

Though not a specific requirement in this course, all students who are enrolled in a degree program are required to maintain an online learning portfolio in Digication that uses the TRCC template. Through this electronic tool, students will have the opportunity to monitor their own growth in college-wide learning. The student will keep his/her

learning portfolio and may continue to use the Digication account after graduation. A Three Rivers General Education Assessment Team will select and review random works to improve the college experience for all students. Work reviewed for assessment purposes will not include names and all student work will remain private and anonymous for college improvement purposes. Students will have the ability to integrate learning from the classroom, college, and life in general, which will provide additional learning opportunities. If desired, students will have the option to create multiple portfolios.

Midterm Reviews

Each student will have an individual appointment with the instructor for the Midterm Review. At this meeting the student will receive their grade as is stands and will have a discussion regarding their performance and progress in class. Any other concerns the student or instructor has will be discussed

Student Art Show

There is a college-wide Student Art Show at the end of every academic year in May. All students who take an art class are invited to submit one piece done in each class to this show. Pieces must be submitted through an instructor. Several cash prizes are awarded to students whose work is displayed in the Student Art Show by an outside juror.

Explanation of Criteria for Evaluation/Grade Weights Projects- The average of all graded pieces comprises 50% of the final grade.

Class Participation - This comprises 25% of the final grade.

Effort/Improvement (Includes how productive you are outside of class and your improvement throughout the semester) - This comprises 25% of the final grade.

Course Requirements

Attendance- Please plan to attend all classes and to miss class only for extenuating circumstances. After 2 unexcused absences, each subsequent absence will result in a half-letter grade reduction to the final grade. Excused absences are only granted if legitimate written documentation is provided such as a doctor's note. An unexcused absence on a critique date will be recorded as two absences.

Tardiness/Leaving Early- Every four times a student leaves early or arrives late equals one absence.

Deadlines- Assignments not completed on time will be lowered one letter grade for each week they are late (an A becomes a B, a $\sqrt{+}$ becomes a $\sqrt{-}$)

Completion of all assignments and attendance at final meeting- No student may receive a passing grade for this course without completing all assignments and must be present at the final meeting to pass the course (unless a legitimate written excuse is provided.)

Evaluation Procedures



Acrylic paints are a hazardous material and must be handled with the proper care. There can be no eating while working with paints as this allows for possible ingestion of the paints. Although not as toxic as oil paints because they do not create fumes, the pigments used in acrylic paints are toxic. They should never be eaten or remain in contact with the skin for extended lengths of time. It is recommended that you wear rubber gloves when painting, but it is not required. If paint makes contact with your skin, wash the area as soon as possible so as to not allow the toxic chemicals to enter your body through the skin.
