**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** Information covered and assigned work is intended to increase the likelihood of a successful and rewarding college *transition* for every student. # **ELECTRONIC LEARNING PORTFOLIOS:**

All students are required to maintain an online learning portfolio in <u>DIGICATION</u>. There is a college template. Through this electronic tool, students will have the opportunity to monitor their own growth in college-wide learning. The student will keep his/her learning portfolio and may continue to use the DIGICATION account after graduation. A Three Rivers General Education Assessment Team will select and review random works to improve the college experience for all. Student work reviewed for assessment purposes will not include names and all student work will remain private and anonymous for college improvement purposes. Students will have the ability to integrate learning from the classroom, college, and life in general, which will provide additional learning opportunities. If desired, students will have the option to create multiple portfolios.

#### **EMAIL:**

Correspondence by email is considered a method of formal communication. Emailing an instructor is not the same as emailing or texting a friend. Please use a proper salutation, complete sentences, punctuation, proper spelling and identify yourself by first and last name in the body of the email. **Students must use** their college issued email account. #### **EVALUATION CRITERIA:**

This course demands **active involvement** in the learning experience accompanied by reading and writing activities that capture those experiences. The nature of the course content requires critical thinking skills to be learned, developed, and applied. Missing an assignment worth 5% can reduce your grade by a half letter grade (e.g., from A- to B+).

### The following criteria will be considered in evaluating student performance:

### A. CAREER EXPLORATION PORTFOLIO (20%)

This multi-part portfolio will help you map your career. You will write a resume and then bring it into the Writing Center for assistance with formatting/tips. Using your resume as a guide, write a 5-7 page paper that will analyze what skills, traits, college courses, and experience you should probably gain during your time in college in order to make yourself more marketable. You should submit your resume and references, but they do not count towards the 5-7 page requirements. Details of the assignment will be passed out on the first day of class. It will also be available in Course Content of Blackboard.

#### **B.** CLASSROOM PARTICIPATION (5%)

You are expected to be actively involved in this course. Lateness and absences will have a <u>negative</u> impact on your grade. If attendance becomes an issue and you decide not to return to class, it is YOUR responsibility to officially withdraw from the course. You must be present for in-class assignments, there are no make-ups.

#### C. COLLEGE SPONSORED ACTIVITY/EVENT REFLECTION (5%)

Each student must participate in at least one Three Rivers Community College <u>sponsored activity or event</u> and submit a 1-2 page typed paper that critiques the experience (sponsor, date, what was it like, etc.). This should be turned in no later than one week after the event.

# D. COLLEGE REFLECTION PAPER: HOW ARE YOU COPING WITH COLLEGE?

Write a 2-3 page reflection discussing how you are coping with college. It should be in first person with MLA format. Directions will be given in the first class. Address such things as: how you are coping with college; Why is college important to you; and How will school impact your life?

# E. DIGICATION - ELECTRONIC LEARNING PORTFOLIO (5%)

Students are required to create and maintain an online learning portfolio using <u>DIGICATION</u>. The learning portfolio is a compilation of all that is accomplished during the semester and will serve as a useful reference tool for the student for semesters to come.

#### F. EDUCATION PLANNING ASSIGNMENT (10%)

This four part assignment will help you map your coursework, design a realistic plan for accomplishing your coursework, and learn to work with your advisor to accomplish your goals. Details of the assignment will be passed out on the first day of class. It will also be available in Course Content of Blackboard.

#### G. EXAM 1 AND EXAM 2 (10% each)

During the semester there will be two exams. Exams will consist of (but will not be limited to) multiple choice, short answer, true/false, matching, and short answers. Exams cannot be made up unless arrangements have been made with the instructor *prior* to the time of the exam.

### H. PROJECT ASSIGNMENT (20%)

Working independently or in groups of up to 4, you will make a video presentation. The topic will be: What advice would you give to a new TRCC student? Address something like: What resources do you think are most valuable at TRCC or something you wish you knew before you started at TRCC? Why is attending TRCC a great choice?; Why is returning to school after an absence a great idea; etc.. Your video must be at least 2 minutes per person (you can provide handouts, but it's not required). Be creative. More information will be provided throughout the semester. Think about what you wish you knew before you started TRCC. This is not meant to be a tour of the school. It is meant for you to give new students important and positive advice about attending TRCC.

#### I. HOMEWORK AND IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS (5%)

Reading and writing assignments are designed to provide opportunities for further exploration of ideas or for confirmation of understanding. All reading and writing assignments are due at the next scheduled class meeting (unless otherwise noted). Homework assignments should be typed using MLA format, unless otherwise noted by the instructor.

# J. SYLLABUS QUIZ (5%)

You will be quizzed on the content of this syllabus. It will include important (underlined, italics, bold) as well as due dates. The quiz will be completed in the first 20-minutes of class time. No makeup quizzes will be given.
