College Consolidation Affects Students, Faculty and <u>Education as a Whole</u>

he merging of CT's community colleges is still controversial in many ways. Jacqueline Rabe Thomas, writer for The CT Mirror, wrote a couple of very informative articles regarding the consolidation of Connecticut's community colleges.

In her article, "Merging CT's Community Colleges is Controversial. Here's Why", Jacqueline states, "Hundreds of positions at Connecticut's 12 community colleges will be shed, more administrative functions will be handled at a central office and millions will be saved without impacting students' education."

This lets us know that this consolidation will be doing plenty of damage to many people that have established their careers at

their respective schools. This is damaging to people's lives.

It's also implied by many that this consolidation is trying to focus on the students more than anything, hence the name "Students First", that was given to it by Board of Regents President Mark Ojakian. However, there is the side that argues that students will also be affected by the consolidation.

Jacqueline wrote another article entitled, "How the "Students First" College Consolidation Effects Students", in which she gives plenty of detail regarding why students will also be affected by the consolidation.

Department Chairs are a position that Board of Regents President Mark Ojakian plan will do away with by the beginning of July 2020. This position is very important for students.

"When students have a problem with a grade they received or other aspects of their education, department chairs at many of the colleges are tasked with trying to remedy the situation. Faculty rely on their department chairs to help them when problems arise and to be their voice to college administrators."

This will be a detriment to students who rely on this faculty position for assistance. The article also gives information regarding how other faculty members in schools feel about the elimination of the Department Chair position.

"The proposed elimination of these department chair positions is upsetting to faculty. That's because many view these chairs as their advocates who understand the nuances and challenges they face problems that may be unique to their departments."

So as it is evident, the college consolidation effects educators, students, faculty, and in turn will effect the education process that is going on in school.

The matter of the college consolidation is constantly being updated as the plan is officially being brought up for consideration on the 18th of April. More information will come as soon as it becomes available, but as for now the debate continues.

Proposed State Transportation Budget <u>**Cuts Directly Affect TRCC Students</u>**</u>

he proposed transportation budget cuts will affect Three Rivers Community College (TRCC) students who rely on the Southeast Area Transit Direct (SEAT) bus service to get to school. through the State's Transportation Fund (STF) by taxing gasoline and diesel fuels. Since 2000, the gasoline tax has not changed and vehicles have become more fuel efficient, causing revenues to decline.

In January of 2018, the state announced it would cut subsidies to its transportation by 15 % for the upcoming fiscal year. Consequently, SEAT could face a 15% cut in funding starting in July 2018 and a 50% cut the following years.

In the past, Connecticut has funded its transportation programs

On March 22, 2018, SEAT notified the community on social media about the proposed service cuts and the step it would have to take if the STF is not fixed. Among the cuts being considered is the elimination of the Three Rivers service route used by students to get to school, and the elimination of bus service after 7 p.m. which would also adversely affect students who attend evening classes.

TRCC has students from all over Connecticut, and not all who attend own a vehicle. These students rely on public transportation to get to classes.

Student Raul Montalban is one of the students at TRCC who takes the SEAT bus to get to and from the college. Concerned about the proposed cuts, he stated, "Many students including myself rely on the transportation to get here, and if they eliminate it in general that would cause many people who use it currently, and in the future, to be unable to come to the college."

Eliminating routes would make it more challenging for students to get to the school. Montalban lives in Ashford, Ct. He already spends a total of four hours on the bus to and from school Monday through Thursday. He stated, "If they eliminate the TRCC service bus, I would have to walk around a mile or two from the main station where I get dropped off at."

Montalban has taken on the task of raising awareness at school about the transportation budget cuts. He wrote a proposal to the President of TRCC, Mary Ellen Jukoski, about the repercussions of proposed transportation cuts, in which he asked President Jukoski to survey the student population that rely on public transit through commnet. Also, a meeting between President Jukoski and state representatives was suggested by Montalban.

Montalban has taken further steps to help his cause. He created a petition and sent it to Senator Cathy Osten. "I got a message back from her saying that she got it, and that she is going to be working to help." He stated.

Students who rely on public transportation have arranged their class schedules around the bus, including Montalban. He feels the effect would be grave on these students if the bus schedule was eliminated or altered.

When asked what he would do if the bus routes were cut, Montalban replied, "I would either not be able to come to school. Or my mom would have to work something out. Not coming to school is not an option. I need to be going to college."

Montalban urges student to have their voice heard. "Students should call our representatives to get their opinion in there. Every little bit helps. Showing public support for the SEAT bus would really make a difference."

Three Rivers Community College Hosts Annual Resource Fair for Military Veterans

hree Rivers Community College hosted their fifth annual Veterans Resource Fair On March 22,2018. A one-stop resource for jobs, education, health services, financial benefits, and networking. The fair was open to all veterans and their families within the Second Congressional District (Eastern Connecticut).

There were over 40 organizations and 20 yellow-ribbon that were representing this event. Universities such as University of New Haven and Southern Connecticut State College were in attendance, companies such as Pfizer and Eversource were also there to discuss to veterans for job opportunities, and even financial advisors from Navy Federal Credit Union, SUBASE New London Branch were also there to discuss financial benefits for veterans.

Sir Snowden, Assistant Director for Veterans and Military Affairs for Southern Connecticut State University, explains the benefits of the veterans are hoping to look for when pursuing an education. "Basically, when coming to the University to be able to provide them the resources they are going to need to be successful in school, as well as being able to take full advantages they have as a veteran, and being able to make sure that they utilize the benefits properly," Snowden said.

"We try to educate them as far as what benefits they have, what they might be eligible for, and just provide them as much information as we possibly can to make sure that this university has the resources they have in order for them to be successful." Snowden then goes into more detail on what benefits the vets will be receiving.

"In terms of benefits from a resource standpoint, we have a veteran's lounge for students that can be able to go there and get away

from campus life. We also have diversity programs that we have set up for students to be successful, and we just try to do our best to be able to separate ourselves from other institutions, just to being able to have our veterans to talk to other veterans, meet other people and have other various interactions, but also at the same time still be able to take advantages all of the resources we provide." Snowden said.

Kim Tracy, a Member Service Representative for the SUBASE New London Branch for Navy Federal Credit Union, also weighs in on how their bank can help out veterans with financial benefits. Tracy mentions how their bank can help out veterans and their military families.

"We help veterans set up any of their financial needs, so if they need help setting up a mortgage or checking account or savings account, basically that's what we do," Tracy said. "Some need help establishing credit because some of them their credit has been destroyed so setting up a credit card, small personal expense loan, and car loans."

Tracy also mentions how all veterans, including retirees, and family members, that is a member of navy federal can really be beneficial to them. These examples highlight the many benefits of what a veteran could be expecting when pursuing an education or making a financial plan.

The TRCC Veterans Resource Fair showed that many universities and organizations wanted to make sure that these veterans are getting the correct resources when pursuing a degree or looking for a job after serving in the military. These vets want to have a smooth transition when entering the second stage of their life after being in the service and these organizations are willing to help that big transition for these veterans.

What are the Status and Rights of <u>Undocumented Immigrants?</u>

The Community Support and Involvement Committee sponsored a presentation by Attorneys Joanne Lewis and Kelly Bonafe to discuss the legal rights of undocumented immigrants in the United States.

s the deadline for ending the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program (DACA) came and went on March 5, 2018, Attorneys Joanne Lewis and Kelly Bonafé from Connecticut Legal Services talked to students, faculty, and the public at TRCC about the rights of undocumented immigrants in the United States.

Attorney Lewis provided statistics to highlight the significance of the population they were discussing.

In the United States, 11 million undocumented immigrants live and work among citizens. In the state of Connecticut alone there are an estimated 105,000 undocumented immigrants and 550,000 foreignborn people, which is 14.4% of the state's population.

Statistics from an article Lewis presented in the New York Times titled "Here's the Reality about Illegal Immigrants in the United States," indicated that the top two ways undocumented immigrants enter the United States is through overstayed visas and crossing over the Mexican border.

Lewis told us there are several pathways to lawful permanent residence which can happen through an employer-based petition, humanitarian-based application and permission, diversity visa, or family-based petition. Lewis went on to talk about the difficulty of getting into the United States without these petitions. "If you don't have a relative, if you don't have a job, if you don't qualify for the diversity

visa, there isn't any way to come into the United States."

With a family-based petition, U.S. Citizens can request to sponsor a visa for a spouse, child, or other family member. However, the waitlist can be quite extensive. For example, according to statistics on a slide Lewis presented, siblings of U.S. Citizens from the Philippines who applied for a family-based petition in November 1994 are still waiting for it to be reviewed.

There are some exceptions for the elderly and disabled, but it's very limited as Lewis said. There are several other immigration categories that a non-resident may fall into, such as lawful deferred action, temporary protection, non-immigrant visas, and lawful permanent residence.

> Lewis pointed out that illegal immigrants don't have much in terms of rights. The Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program (DACA) and the Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors Act (DREAM) are a couple of the laws that legally support illegal immigrants.

Under DACA. people who came into the United States illegally before 2007 and were under the age of 16 were granted renewable status to work. However, they have no legal status and must renew their visa every 2 years. The current political discussion has been over the government's decision to rescind the DACA Program. While a decision on this has been put off until 2019, the initial act to rescind the program has left many immigrants at risk for deportation as their visas expire,

according to Lewis.

While DACA recipients are at risk of being deported, Lewis says the most at-risk population of immigrants are those who commit crimes and those who admit they're undocumented. Both of these scenarios can result in deportation.

Under the U.S. legal system, immigrants do not possess the same due process rights as citizens. This means they have the right to an attorney, but not a free one. Nor are they entitled to be read Miranda rights.

To avoid deportation, Lewis said their organization advises immigrants to not use notaries in any scenario, even to acquire a legal status in the US because they are not licensed to provide Immigration Legal Services. Lewis also advises immigrants to not go to U.S. Citizen and Immigration Services without a lawyer because they can be detained even without a criminal record.

If an immigrant is looking to obtain legal services, there are several local organizations that are qualified to provide them. Finally, Lewis explained the rigorous process a non-resident must go through in order to obtain citizenship. She said they must be a lawful permanent resident for 5 years, a person of good moral character, and pass an English language and Civics

exam.

Five Crostini Bites Sure to <u>Cure your Craving for a Quick Bite</u>

With a few ingredients and a couple of minutes you're sure to be satisfied with these quick and easy to make crostini bites

ooking for a quick bite to eat? Look no further! These easy to make crostini bites are perfect for any busy student! With a loaf of French bread and a few ingredients, you can make a warm snack on a cold spring day or make a few and turn it into a meal. With just one loaf of French bread, you can make a whole lot of small snacks with delicious flavors.



Directions: To begin, preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Cut up a loaf of French bread into 1-inch thick pieces and drizzle lightly with olive oil. Pop them into the oven for 6 – 10 minutes or until golden brown. Once warmed through and lightly toasted, throw your favorite toppings on or try one of these recipes.



Brie, Pear & Honey Top with a slice of brie and put it back in the oven for 3 – 6 minutes, or until the brie is melted. Add a couple slices of pear, drizzle with honey, and add a touch of cracked pepper.



Pepperoni & Mozzarella

Top the crostini with a few layers of mozzarella then pepperoni. Layers can alternate between mozzarella and pepperoni or they can just be stacked. Put them back in the oven for 4 - 6 minutes or until the cheese is melted and the pepperoni heated through. Let it cool down before eating.



Mozzarella & Tomato Place some deli cut or fresh mozzarella on top of the crostini and add a few slices of tomato. Enjoy cold or put it back in the oven for 2 – 4 minutes to melt the cheese.



Mozzarella, Tomato, and Avocado

Add deli cut or fresh mozzarella on, a couple slices of tomato, and a sliver of avocado on top of the crostini. It can be eaten cold or put it back in the oven for 2 – 4 minutes to melt the cheese.

Cucumber & Cream Cheese Spread a thin layer of cream cheese on each crostini. Add a few thinly sliced cucumbers to it and enjoy! This crostini is best served cold.
