Course Description

This course offers an introduction to the basic principles of finance with an emphasis on the role a finance manager plays in the corporate world. Areas covered are financial analysis and forecasting, operating and financial leverage, short and long-term financing alternatives, capital budgeting, time value of money, mergers and acquisitions, and international financial management.

Assignments

Readings

Chapters will be assigned each week. A digital textbook is available through your Connect Access, or you are welcome to buy a paper copy textbook. Assigned readings are expected to be completed prior to coming to class as the concepts in the chapter will be taught in class on the dates listed on the syllabus.

Homework

Homework assignments will be assigned each class. The due dates for completing the homework are generally due on Monday following when the material was taught. I strongly urge you to do the homework on a weekly basis and come with questions to any class prior to the close of that homework assignment. The homework assignments will not be accepted through email or if they are late.

Ouizzes

There may be quizzes given in addition to two exams during the semester. Each quiz will center around the finance concepts learned in a given chapter. Quizzes may or may not be announced prior to the date given. Quizzes will be given at the start of class. Arrive on time as no make-up quizzes will be given.

Exams

There will be two exams during the semester. The first exam will center around the finance concepts learned prior to the exam. The final exam will center around the material learned after the first exam but may draw on concepts from any previous period.
