CT State Students Protest Budget Cuts

They say, "cut back," we say, "fight back."

n April 1st Professor Diba Khan-Bureau and the Environmental Engineering Technology & Three Rivers United Environmentalists gathered students for the Three Rivers Student Picket. With NBC and WSHU Public Radio attending the picket, Three Rivers was able to publicly protest the continuous budget cuts that stem from the CT State Merger.

The CT State budget cuts have had an immediate effect on the student body. Students have struggled to navigate their college with diminishing resources.

The campus library now closes at 7pm, with no weekend hours offered. The cafeteria now has limited hours, resulting in less students having access to food on campus.

Professor Diba Khan-Bureau provided insight on the issues at hand, stating, "Right now, the governor does not want to fund us. We need about \$150 million to fund the 12 campuses of the CT State Community College and the four CSU's and UCONN. Those are the state Colleges and universities. Senator Osten is the Appropriations Committee chair. [She] and Tony Walker. They do not want to provide us with the funding we need. The governor doesn't want to provide us with the funding we need."

Students and faculty alike were empowered to make their voice heard at the student picket. Professor Philip Mayer stressed the importance of this rally, saying, "Three Rivers Community College and the entire Community College system in Connecticut is very important for developing our economy and helping to fill the jobs that we have. Our students



Khan-Bureau advocated for this notion, stressing, that, "Community colleges used to be the 'gems of Connecticut'. Now we're one Community College. They need to fund us. If they don't fund us, they're going to see a reduction in student population. They're going to lay off faculty, [...] and then the students won't have what they need to continue their education. Don't get me wrong, can they continue their education? Absolutely. It will just be much more... Difficult. And look, what's happening here Isn't a local issue, it really is coming from the top. [...] It's not from our local administration here, it's really from Hartford and New Britain."

Baylee Gagnier, a student worker at Three Rivers, shared her experience with the budget cuts, stating, "The tutoring center I work at is now understaffed with hours and tutors, making it more difficult for students to get the help they need to succeed in their classes. Our cafeteria is now fully closed on Fridays, making it impossible for me and many other students to buy the food they need between work hours and class time. Along with these budget cuts, student worker hours have been cut drastically from 20 hours a week to only 10 hours. For most of our student workers, this is not enough to support us. My friend and classmate works in our financial aid department at the College. Because her work hours had been cut,

Gagnier concluded her speech by explaining that, "We want our students to succeed and uplift us in this state with their higher education. This merger has only brought us farther from this goal, hindering students in their success by limiting the helpful benefits of the college that they pay to go to, you must take a look at what is happening on campus when making these decisions you claim will help us, but have done nothing but hurt the students paying and eventually and eventually our entire state in the long run."

she now had to get a second job, working till midnight to earn enough money for herself and to pay for her education." In light of the budget cuts, the majority of student workers are now forced to balance two jobs alongside their education and personal lives. The hardworking students and staff at Three Rivers have made it clear: they are not getting the well-deserved support they need.



Follow-up on Campus Accessibility

An interview with Tom Bailey clears up questions & concerns

Last issue, an article was made to address the disparity with the accessibility on campus. Specifically, the motion controlled doors used by handicap and motion challenged people that have been inoperable for the last two semesters. In a follow-up discussion with Tom Bailey, who oversees any campus issues, he gave some insight on the problem at hand.

"Well, it is at the top of my list for facilities issues."

Tom Bailey explained that the problem is a stream of four separate issues that coexist with each other, starting with a component that's burned out. This leads onto a multitude of other problems that are unfortunately specific to the manufacturer, which means contractors or repairmen cannot remedy the broken parts. After calling the electrician again, Tom was notified that it's actually the access control system. This means the campus now has to call contractors to do the lock replacements amongst the handful of other personnel needed.

When asked if there's an estimated time frame of when the doors will be operational again, Tom said "I am hoping to get it as soon as possible. I wish I had a estimate. It's what I can get the four entities to come here."

Tom also touched on other disparities around the campus that he would like to pursue, "I was just meeting this afternoon that somebody that's visually challenged said that the stairwells don't have any type of strips on the steps. To warn them that you're going down a step or something like that? Not a requirement, but it's probably a good thing to do. There's a lot of these good things.





GUITAR PEDAL LESSON

Guitar effects pedals are essential to many guitar players' arsenals. They hold sounds that you wouldn't normally get from running through just an amp; with basic EQ functions. Favorites among players are the wah wahs, phasers, boosts, choruses, and more. There really isn't a right or wrong way of ordering your pedals how you like, but there is a preferred way that many players use. This lesson will cover the order of each pedal, what types of pedals there are, and what they do.



The tuner pedal is very important, especially if you plan to build a board. This pedal does what the name implies, and tunes your instrument. Playing an out of tune instrument is just as bad, if not worse, than playing without strings. This pedal is very simple as you really need to hit the button, and tune each string to whatever note you wish.

The boost pedal is a very effective and favorite pedal of many players. Wanting to cut through the mix a little more, or have something to bump you up for any lead or solo; this pedal does the job. There are many types of boosters out there with a varied amount of knobs and functions. Some boosters focus on the volume increase, as others focus on the grit and saturation of your tone.





The delay pedal is used in many bands like Pink Floyd or U2. This pedal adds a special sound to your rig, as it can repeat the note hit. The functions on this pedal can control the amount of repetition, speed, and fading of the delayed notes. This pedal is very versatile, and can inspire new ideas to your playing.



The EQ pedal is a pedal that should be on many players' boards. It equalizes the sound made, and can make the player fine tune their overall tone. Whether they want more mids, highs, or lows, the EQ can make all of those final edits. This tends to go last in the chain in a board, because it has its effect on all the effects that come before it.




The order on how you should lay out your board is shown above. Tuners will go first, and that is where your guitar will plug in. Boosts, overdrives, and distortions usually come next. Phasers, wahs, choruses, and whammies will go after. These are in the category of actual modulation effects that really impact the voicing of your instrument. Time based effects like delays will go after these pedals. The reason it's preferred in this order, is because it makes more sense to delay an overdriven guitar than to overdrive a delay effect. The last pedal in the chain will be the EQ pedal. This tightens up and finalizes your overall tone you will get before running a cable to your amp.



The wah pedal is a favorite among famous guitarists like Jimi Hendrix, Kirk Hammett, Zach Wilde, and Jimmy Page. It does as the name entails, and makes a sort of "wah wah" baby-like noise with your instrument. Now, It is more appealing to listen to than a baby crying. The pedal itself is an expression type pedal like the pitch shifter where the action of your foot swaying back and forth, controls the sound produced. When your foot is pressed down, more treble is added to your signal, and when it is pressed the other way, makes the signal more bassier and muddier. This is not a bad sound, as Mark Knopfler of Dire Straits used this method in the song "Money For Nothing." This pedal is super fun, and can be a great addition to any player's arsenal.






Derek's Drawing tutorial



Drawing is a creative activity that can be done anywhere at any time. However, many people are intimidated by this artform because of how complex it can be. What many people do not know is that you can draw anything you want to by breaking it down into simple lines and small steps. Here is how to draw a bird in 5 easy steps!!




Eye and Wing

Draw a circle for the eye. For the wing, draw one curved line. Draw two lines to add detail to the tail, and draw small, wide rectangles at the top of the legs.




Beak

Start by drawing a triangle that peaks on the right hand side. Below the triangle, draw a wide "U" shape.



The Head and Body

At the top of the triangle, draw a half-circle that ends near the middle of the beak. Next, draw a slightly curved, diagonal line. On the opposite side, draw a long, backwards "S" that connects to the line on the right side.




Drawing Tutorial



Legs and Tail

For the tail, draw a rectangle. For the first leg, draw a two diagonal lines, and two arches that point down. Slightly above the first leg, draw one more diagonal line and arch.



Details and Feathers

Shade in the eye, leaving the top left corner blank, to give the reflecting effect. This will make the eye look more realistic. Draw a repeated pattern of jagged "U" shapes to make the feathers. For the wings, draw diagonal lines at the bottom, and a vertical cylinder pattern at the mid section. Chicken Wing Recipe

- Lemon juice
- BBQ sauce
- Jalapeno ranch
- Minced garlic

STEPS: (FOR BOTH WINGS)

1. Preheat the oven to 375

degrees Fahrenheit.

While the oven is heating, sauce up chicken wings and prepare the pan.

2. Layout chicken wings evenly across the pan so they all rest flush and even.

Wings cook better spread apart, especially when they are not overlapping

3. Place wings in oven for around 45 minutes

Make sure to check up on them, and flip half way through for even cooking.

lemon jalapeno Garlic Dry Rub

- Ingredients:
- Chicken wings
- Olive oil
- Lemon juice
- Dry Rub (Of Your Choice)
- Minced garlic

4. After the time, take wings out, and temp check.

Chicken wings should be at least 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

5. Let the wings rest for 5 minutes.

This ensures the internal heat will continue to cook, even when out of the oven. Moisture is also absorbed back into the meat, to make them more juicy.


6. Enjoy and eat.


